

Spring Moisture and Flooding Support

Saskatchewan Crop Insurance Corporation Options

Delayed Seeding

Inability to seed due to excess moisture and flooding are insurable causes of loss. The final deadline for seeding most crops and receiving insurance coverage is June 20.

Unseeded Acreage Feature

The Unseeded Acreage feature is included with multi-peril Crop Insurance, providing coverage for land too wet to seed due to excessive spring moisture. Claims are not accepted after June 25.

Establishment Benefit

The Establishment Benefit, as part of the multi-peril Crop Insurance Program, provides coverage for crops that fail to establish or suffer a loss prior to June 20. If producers have crops damaged by insurable causes of loss, including flooding, they can register an Establishment Benefit claim.

Contact SCIC immediately if you would like to reseed or work down a portion of insured crop. An adjuster needs to inspect the acres prior to reseeding or destroying the acres.

AgriStability

The AgriStability Program uses margins to determine if you are eligible for benefit payments to offset the impacts of flooding, considering the change in inventory from one year to the next.

- Any grain or feed inventory loss is factored into the margin calculation, reducing the Program Year margin.
- For livestock, any animals lost due to flooding will impact the inventory on the farm as well as the revenues for the operation.
- Land too wet to seed or land that was seeded and then flooded will also be captured and AgriStability will account for the lost production on the farm and will capture those losses in the margin calculation.
